My solution:	Write a "Tips and Tricks" job aid to guide the team.

Trivia Questions—**Tips and Tricks**

1. The "Did you know...?" Factor

Questions that have the "Did you know...?" factor illicit these responses:

"I should have known that!" "No WAY!" "That's cool!" "Whoa..." "Wait till I tell..."

The bottom line is that our questions need to be based on cool stuff that kids will find interesting—whether they know the answer or not. They should want to share these fascinating bits of trivia with their friends.

2. Make it Personal

When appropriate, use the word "you" to make the questions more personal and relevant.

<u>Generic</u>

True or False: Cactus juice is a good source of liquid for desert survival.

vs.

<u>Personal</u>

True or False: You can survive for days in the desert by drinking cactus juice.

3. Interesting Approaches

Find different approaches to asking questions that make them sound less like dictionary definitions and more like cool stuff to know.

<u>Standard</u>

A thespian is:

- a. an actor
- b. a lawyer
- c. a dancer
- d. a bird doctor

<u>Different</u>

Who was a famous thespian?

- a. Marilyn Monroe
- b. Ben Franklin
- c. Florence Nightingale
- d. Babe Ruth

Or...

4. The Impossible

7. Keep it Casual

The language and feel of our questions should be casual vs. encyclopedic. Our questions should also be straightforward, clear, and concise. We do not want to be extra hip or trendy, nor do we want to sound too straight-laced and highbrow.

8. Dialog

We are willing to sacrifice variety in the wording of our questions for the sake of good concatenation.
